Cultural Activities at Air University

Air University (AU) has long recognized the importance of promoting diversity and unity among the citizens of Pakistan through cultural activities. The university actively organizes events that celebrate the rich tapestry of cultures within the country, encouraging participation from students and faculty across various institutions. By inviting students and teachers from other universities to engage in these activities, AU fosters an inclusive atmosphere that enhances understanding and collaboration among diverse groups.

Security Measures and Access Protocols

Since its establishment in the year 2000, Air University has faced unique challenges due to the heightened security concerns in Islamabad, the capital of Pakistan. As a result, the university has implemented strict access controls to ensure the safety and security of its campus.

- **Restricted Access:** Public entry to university buildings is limited, requiring visitors to present identification cards or passes to gain access. This policy is in place to maintain a secure environment for students and staff.
- **Permission for External Research:** Students and staff from other universities seeking to conduct research or projects at AU must first obtain permission from the university's competent authorities. This ensures that the necessary protocols are followed and that resources are available to external researchers.

Air University South Campus (AUSC)

The Air University South Campus (AUSC) project is strategically aligned with government initiatives aimed at enhancing the quality of higher education in Pakistan. The development of this campus is a response to the government's Vision 2025, which focuses on regional growth associated with the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) and the expansion of the aviation industry.

- **Location and Land Acquisition:** The new AUSC is planned in Sector H-11/2 of Islamabad. In March 2015, the Capital Development Authority (CDA) allotted 17.5 acres of land to Air University on the directive of the Prime Minister.
- **Infrastructure Development:** The planned facilities at AUSC include:
 - **Academic Blocks:** Ten academic blocks, each comprising ten stories and equipped with two levels of basement parking, are designed to

accommodate the Faculties of Engineering, Administration, Aviation, Social Sciences, and Basic Sciences.

- **Auditorium:** A dedicated auditorium for convocations and conferences will serve as a central venue for large gatherings and events.
- **Hostel Facilities:** Three ten-story hostel blocks will be built, with separate accommodations for boys and girls, each capable of housing around 600 students.
- **Library and Research Centers:** A state-of-the-art, fully automated library will provide students and faculty with access to extensive resources. Two specialized research centers are also planned to support academic inquiry and innovation.
- **Conducive Learning Environment:** The AUSC campus will feature open spaces, green areas, and additional facilities designed to create a supportive environment for both students and faculty. This holistic approach to campus design reflects Air University's commitment to fostering academic excellence and personal development.

Through these initiatives, Air University aims not only to meet but exceed the educational targets set by the government, ensuring that students receive the highest quality education in a safe and supportive environment.



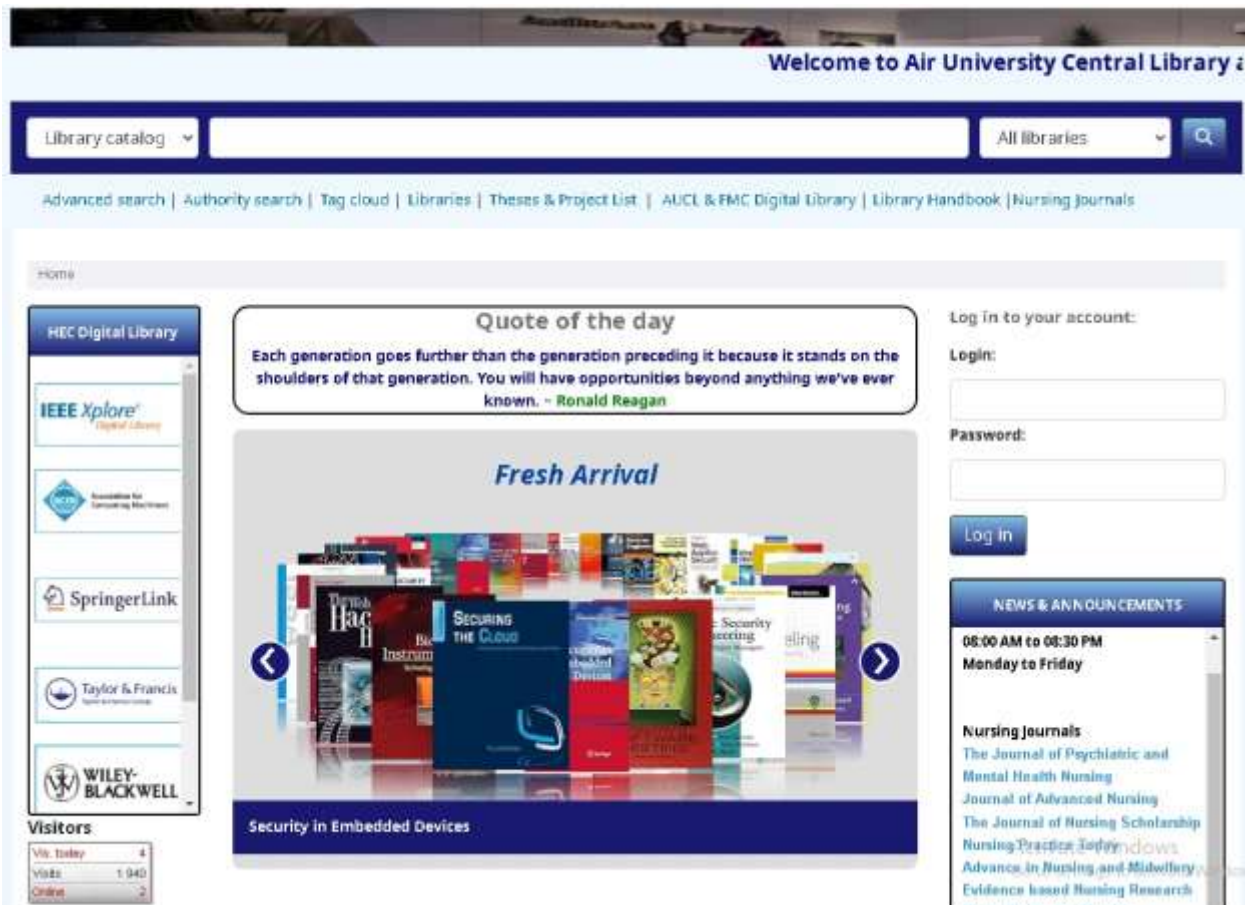
Public Access to Libraries

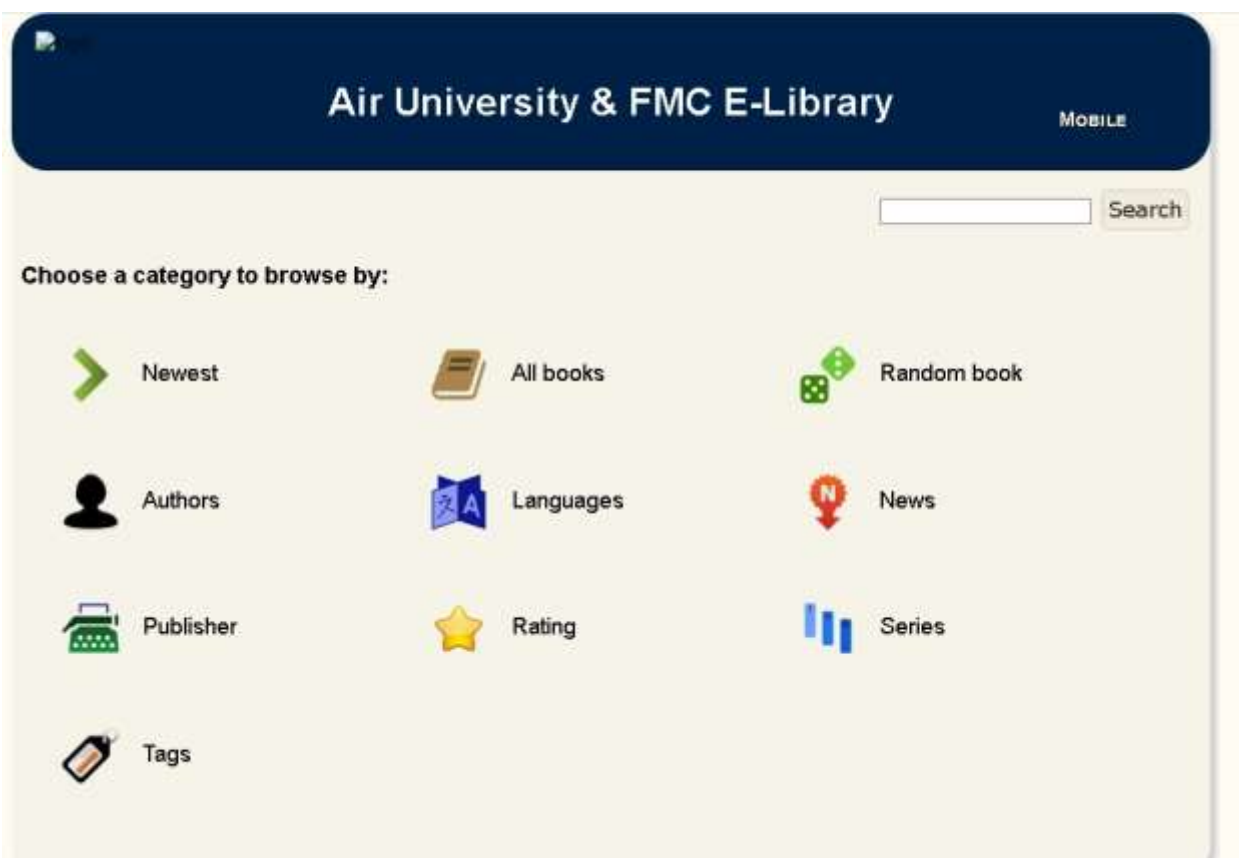

The university's libraries are designed to facilitate learning, research, and cultural enrichment through the following initiatives:

1. **Open Access Policies:** Air University encourages access to its library facilities for students, faculty, and researchers from other institutions. While there are security protocols in place, efforts are made to allow external users to utilize library resources for academic purposes.
2. **Comprehensive Collections:** The libraries at Air University house extensive collections of books, publications, and digital resources that cover a wide range of subjects, including arts, humanities, social sciences, and technical fields. This diverse array of materials supports the academic needs of students while also fostering an appreciation for cultural and artistic heritage.

3. **Cultural Programs and Events:** The libraries often host cultural events, workshops, and exhibitions that celebrate local arts and heritage, thereby engaging the university community and the public. These programs aim to promote awareness and appreciation for the rich cultural tapestry of Pakistan.
4. **Research Support:** Air University's libraries provide access to various research materials, including archives, journals, and databases, enabling students and researchers to explore topics related to arts and heritage in depth.
5. **Community Engagement:** The university aims to strengthen its ties with the local community by inviting residents and scholars to access library resources, participate in events, and engage with the university's cultural initiatives.

Through these efforts, Air University not only enhances the educational experience of its students but also plays a significant role in promoting arts and heritage within the wider community, contributing to the preservation and appreciation of cultural diversity.





Air University Library

The Air University Central Library aims to enrich learning, teaching and research Programs of the University by providing timely access to high quality scholarly information and learning material in a variety of formats. With this mission in mind, the library aims to be a premier provider of knowledge- based information resources and user- focused services.

Located in a large multi-story dedicated building, the library has a print collection of more than 15844 volumes. About 51 serial publications and 07 newspapers are on subscription list. Campus wide access to more than 22,000 electronic journals and more than 140,000 ebooks is available through the HECs National Digital Library Program.

In addition to students, faculty and other administrative staff members of the University, the library offers paid membership to PAF personnel, academicians and research scholars. There are 06 discussion rooms for group study and 56 fully equipped study carrels and 70 computers for researchers. Air University

Lending privileges differ for various categories of membership.

Renewal and reservation services are also available for the same.

Reference Service AUCL also provides Reference Service. Users may ask queries via telephone or through e-mail Searching Assistance For items not located on the shelf or easily accessible in the catalog, inquiry can be made at the circulation desk where assistance will be provided.

Current Awareness Service (CAS) Through Fresh Arrivals information about new additions to the collection is regularly send to all members via e-mail. New additions remain on New Arrival's Shelf for a week before sending to their relevant sections. Press Clippings containing news about higher education is also circulated through e-mail. Inter Library Loan (ILL) Material (including books, magazine/journal articles or newspaper articles) not owned by AUCL can be borrowed from any other Pakistani library. Initially this service is limited to some local university libraries only. T

his service is available to all AUCL library members at no charge. Please first verify unavailability of the required material in AUCL collection by checking library catalogue. For any such material request can be made through ILL Request Form available at circulation desk. The request is send to other libraries through e-mail or via telephone. When request is met the external library sends the original item or a photocopy of it. It can take 3 week or more to get the required item.

Friends of the Library In addition to students, faculty and other administrative staff members of the university, we are ready to entertain PAF personnel and academicians and research scholars who wish to consult library resources under the category of paid membership. Library membership is now open to PAF personnel and academicians and research scholars through "Friends of the Library" program.

A Friend is allowed to use all library resources as per policy. Annual membership fee is Rs 500/- with a refundable security of Rs. 5000. A guarantor (must be an officer of the university) is required to provide guaranty.

Membership form can be obtained from library circulation desk or download it now. Online Searching Eleven terminals are dedicated for online database searching. Think Anew The Library hosts an occasional series of discussions, "Think Anew", on various interesting topics.

The idea is to encourage people to express new ideas based on the presentation made by the speaker. A film may be shown as part of the presentation.

This 45 minute open-ended discussion is open to everyone including external visitors. 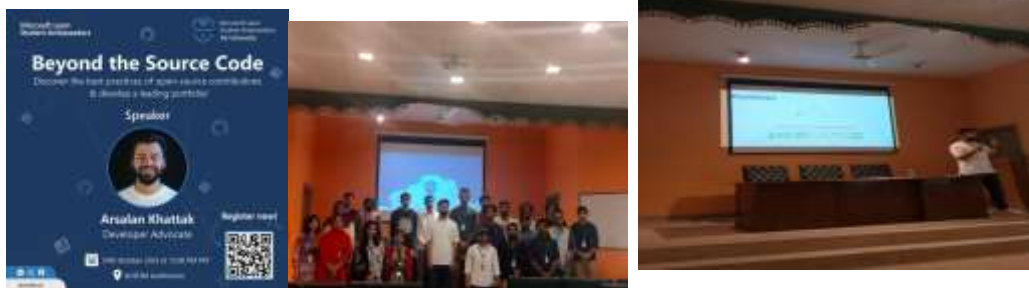

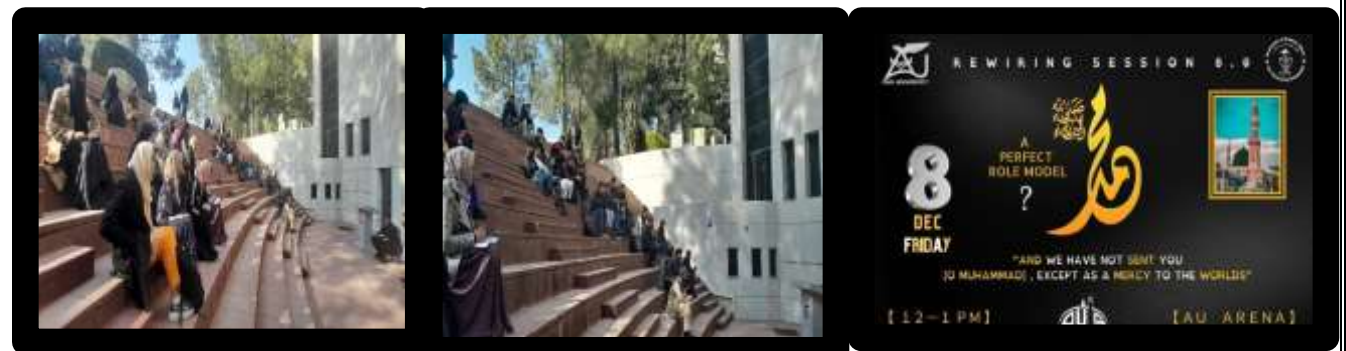

Description:

- ❖ Pedestrian paths are available at Air University to provide easy access to everyone as well as a variety of benefits such as safety and mobility. In addition, walking along the campus's roadway has been reduced.

- ❖ A street lamp for pedestrians is also available on campus at night.
- ❖ Ramps are also constructed to allow handicapped people to readily access any building via footpaths, and Air University took into account the geometric design of the walkways slopes and drainage system during rainy weather.

Air University

Policy – Pedestrian Pathways & Safety

General

- Pedestrian rights are becoming a necessity for being able to travel freely due to the approaching trends of traffic on roadsides. Nearly 4,000 students and staff members attend the university daily; they have a right to walk by the roadside on paths that have been designated for their safety to prevent accidents or injuries. Additionally, people who are physically challenged or disabled deserve special consideration and care when transporting wheelchairs from parking lots to departments or elsewhere on the university grounds. The safety of students is given great consideration at Air University, with an emphasis on physically challenged students and employees.

Purpose

- This policy's goal is to explain how to create an action plan for pedestrian safety that has a specific emphasis on staff and student members with disabilities.

Procedures

The creation and implementation of a Pedestrian Safety Action Plan that takes into account their unique issues and demands have become a need to meet international standards and national processes. For efficient pedestrian movement, the following steps are advised.

- It is required to plan the routes for the convenience of the staff, students, teachers, and other university stakeholders during the new construction and expansion of the building.
- Old buildings need to be modified and appropriate pathways designed and constructed to facilitate the movement of disabled personnel.
- A dedicated parking space will be available with a red wheelchair icon and the parking will be located as close as possible to the main building.
- No other person should be allowed to park a car/vehicle/motorbike at wheelchair

parking. Violators must be fined heavily.

- The access routes must be equipped with adequate lighting and safety grates, and must not be raised to avoid wheelchair fall accidents.
- Wheelchair users have the right of way against all automobiles and individuals.
- Every stakeholder on the ground should strive to help people with disabilities.
- Respective Departments must ensure smooth and safe movement of wheelchairs on daily basis, and cell numbers must be noted by supervisors / HODs.
- Pathways / Ramps must be fixed with rubber matt to avoid slip/skid movement of the wheelchair.
- In addition to the aforementioned pathways, dedicated staircases and footpaths must be constructed for the mobility of regular personnel.
- The A&S Directorate must receive all information about the disabled student at the time of enrolment (freshmen) in order to update records and make the required arrangements well in advance of the start of the semester.
- To fulfill this need of disabled people, paths must be provided in the forthcoming south campus.

Conclusion

- People who are physically disabled need to be gently encouraged and assisted to avoid any resentment and to build their confidence so they can lead better lives with better jobs and education. For such people to have a comfortable and memorable experience at Air University and in society at large, it is the responsibility of every individual in society in general and Air University in particular.

Air University Telecommuting and Flexible Work Policy

Objective: To reduce the environmental impact of daily commuting and promote a work-life balance, Air University encourages flexible work options, including telecommuting, remote work, and condensed work schedules for eligible employees.

1. Purpose:

This policy aims to support a sustainable work environment by minimizing employee commuting through flexible work arrangements. By promoting remote work and offering condensed workweek options, Air University seeks to reduce traffic congestion, lower emissions, and enhance employee productivity and satisfaction.

2. Scope:

This policy applies to eligible staff and faculty across departments where job roles allow for remote work, telecommuting, or flexible scheduling without compromising the quality of work or service delivery.

3. Telecommuting and Remote Work Options:

- **Eligibility:** Employees whose roles do not require physical presence on campus may apply for telecommuting or remote work. Approval is subject

to the discretion of department heads, based on work nature and operational needs.

- **Remote Work Schedule:** Eligible employees may work remotely up to two days per week, provided they maintain regular communication and deliver outcomes as scheduled.
- **Performance Monitoring:** Remote work employees must submit weekly progress reports to their supervisors. Performance will be monitored to ensure continuity and productivity.

4. Condensed Workweek:

- **Eligibility:** Employees may request a condensed workweek arrangement (e.g., four 10-hour days instead of five 8-hour days), allowing them one additional day off each week to reduce commuting.
- **Approval Process:** Department heads will review and approve condensed workweek requests, ensuring that operational needs are met and employee workload can be managed effectively within the revised schedule.
- **Scheduling:** Condensed workdays should be scheduled to maintain departmental coverage and minimize disruption to university operations.

5. Responsibilities of Telecommuting Employees:

- **Maintain a productive remote work environment and adhere to scheduled work hours.**
- **Ensure data security and confidentiality when working outside university premises.**
- **Attend all required meetings and check-ins, whether virtual or in-person.**

6. University Support and Resources:

Air University will provide necessary resources, such as secure access to university networks and online collaboration tools, to support remote work and ensure seamless communication across teams.

7. Environmental Commitment:

By enabling flexible work arrangements, Air University contributes to reducing its carbon footprint, supporting sustainability objectives, and aligning with its broader mission to foster a responsible, eco-conscious campus culture.

Air University is dedicated to maintaining the highest standards in infrastructure development, aligning its construction and facilities with both national and international building codes to ensure safety, durability, and sustainability. The university's commitment to quality in infrastructure is demonstrated through strict adherence to various Pakistani building codes and safety provisions, as well as international standards that guarantee robust construction practices.

Building Code of Pakistan - Seismic Provisions (2007)

Air University constructs all new buildings and structures in accordance with the *Building Code of Pakistan - Seismic Provisions (2007)*. These provisions are crucial for engineering design, requiring all buildings to be constructed to withstand seismic activity and maintain safety standards. Compliance with these codes is not optional; any deviation is treated as a violation of professional engineering regulations, as per the stipulations under the Pakistan Engineering Council (PEC). The PEC reviews and updates these seismic provisions every five years or as necessary, ensuring they remain current and responsive to evolving safety requirements.

Building Code of Pakistan - Energy Provisions (2011)

In alignment with sustainable construction practices, Air University follows the *Building Code of Pakistan - Energy Provisions (2011)*, which mandates energy-efficient design and construction. These energy provisions set minimum requirements for reducing energy consumption, thus enhancing the environmental efficiency of campus buildings.
